## **Committee News**

What great summer months we have had to enjoy all that this country has to offer. Or perhaps you got away to appreciate even more exotic climes for different vistas, culture and food.

Since the Newsletter was last published at the beginning of May, and before the Committee took a break for July and August, a lot of things happened in the intervening period: two Committee Meetings, two General Meetings, and the Annual General Meeting. The AGM held at the end of May was well attended and there we reported on changes in Committee membership. In particular, Neil McQuillan stepped down as Treasurer and he was thanked profusely for doing a brilliant job over the past three years, making a substantial contribution re-organising financial recording practices. Neil was replaced by John Nicholson, who was co-opted five months previous, so he certainly hit the ground running and we are all seeing the benefit of this.

But, going into the 2025-26 year, it was highlighted that there will be a total of **five** vacancies on Committee at the end of the year. So, the call is out now for people with an interest in event management or to co-ordinate Group activities, arrange speakers for the General Meetings, organise and edit material for the Newsletter or to act as Deputy Treasurer. That being said, if none of these roles particularly interest you, please do not be deterred; speak to one of the current Committee, who will be able to answer any questions

about all that is involved. It is of course possible for interested individuals to be co-opted to Committee to see how it works, get to know current members and find out what sort of contribution suits them best. Members can share their general organisational, administrative or leadership skills, developed over many years, for the benefit of this charity organisation and its members. Your help is really needed and you will be making a very important contribution to the life and future of Belfast u3a.

It is going to be a momentous year ahead for Belfast u3a, and there is much to look forward to. It has been mentioned a few times already that this will be our 25th anniversary year. And now it is possible to let you know of the exciting schedule of events that are in place for the celebrations. First, there is a meeting and lunch for Group Convenors on 17 September. This takes place usually on a yearly basis, but this year will be special, as the event will be held in Belfast Castle, the place where Brian Connors, having visited Foyle u3a, obtained some European Funding and organised an open day in the Autumn of 2000 to begin the creation of the Belfast u3a. Convenors will be joined for lunch by Committee members, past and present, to recognise all contributions to the evolution and prosperity of the organisation. Then, the big event will take place early next year in Belfast City Hall on the afternoon of 26 February 2026. This date is more or less a match to the date that full membership of the Third Age Trust was granted (on 28.02 2001). We are grateful to the Belfast City Council for their kind generosity in providing the venue and a contribution to costs. Coming to the end of the anniversary year in mid-June 2026, a showcasing of Group activity will be held at a gathering at Smoke Specialist BBQ, located in Carryduff. And of course, during the year, the very successful series of monthly talks will continue, with the speakers for Autumn confirmed as below.

After the summer break, our weekly meetings are due to begin again on Monday 15 September 2025 at the usual time of 2pm-4pm.


Our last meeting on Monday 16th June was an eventful one on two counts: -.
